BUTTERFLIES

By Myoshi Kuroi

SIZE:
21 1/4 by 16 3/4 inches, including edging 5/8" deep.

MATERIALS:
Cordonnet crochet cotton no. 40, white, about 685 yds. Steel crochet hook US size 13 (size 11 if you tend to work very tightly) or **SIZE FOR GAUGE.**

GAUGE:
4" square = 17 1/2 meshes and 17 1/2 rows.

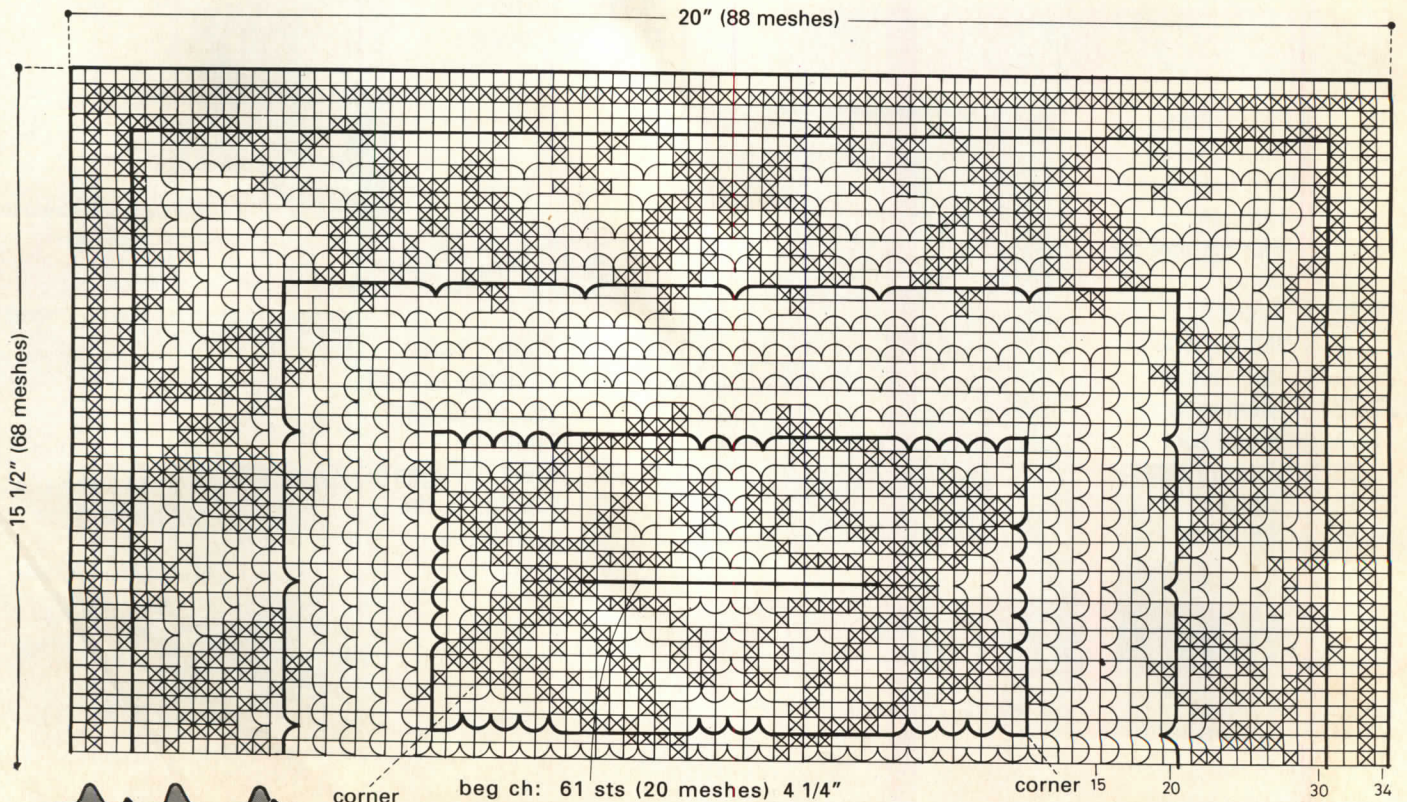
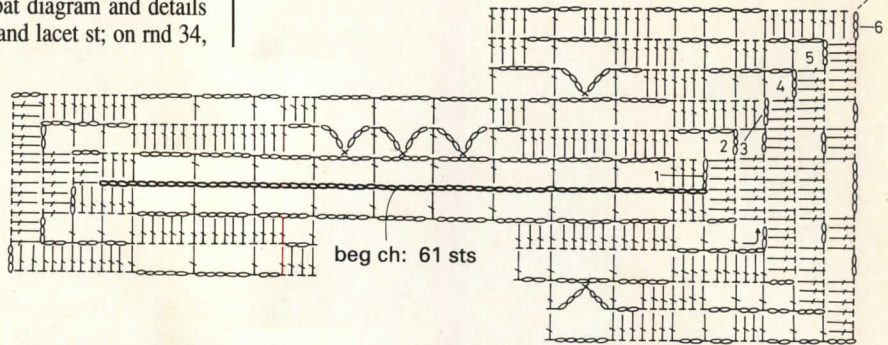
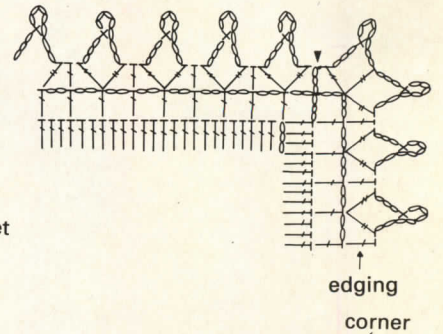
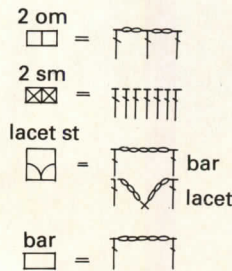
NOTE:
Lacet stitch consists of 2 rows, 1 row lacets and 1 row bars or vice versa.

TO MAKE:
Beg at center of mat, ch 61 + 3 to count as first dc. **RND 1:** Dc in 5th st from hook and in each of next 2 sts, then work * 5 ch, sk 5 sts, dc in next st, rep from * 8

times more, dc in each of last 3 sts, ** 3 ch, 3 dc (that is, 2 over stem of last dc and 1 in same st as that dc), rep from ** once more, dc in each of next 3 sts, work (5 ch, sk 5 sts, dc in next st) 9 times, dc in each of next 3 sts, 3 ch, 6 dc (that is, 2 over stem of last dc, 1 in same st as that dc, 2 in ch-3 counting as first dc and 1 in 3rd st of that ch-3). **RND 2:** Ch 5, work dc in same st as last dc, 1 open mesh <om> (= 2 ch, sk 2 sts, dc in next st), 5 solid meshes <sm> (= * 5 dc in bar, dc in next dc, rep from * once more, 2 dc in next ch-5 lp, 1 dc in 3rd st of same ch-5 lp), 1 om, 3 lacets (= * 3 ch, sc in bar, 3 ch, dc in dc, rep from * twice more), complete rnd as shown. **RNDS 3-34:** Work following pat diagram and details of om, sm and lacet st; on rnd 34,

close with sl st in 3rd st of ch-5. Finish with 1 rnd **edging** as shown; close with sl st in top of ch-3. Fasten off (see black wedge).

HOW TO WORK PATTERNS FROM OUR DIAGRAMS

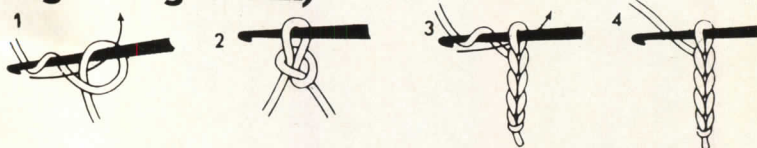
On this page and the next, you will find the key abbreviations and symbols used in our diagrams and instructions. Step-by-step illustrations show newcomers how to work the basic stitches and techniques. Additional abbreviations or symbols needed for a specific project will be included and explained with that pattern. Note that, in each diagram, rounds or rows are numbered in lightface, while a boldface number inside a loop indicates how many chain stitches to work in that loop.

How to follow the diagrams

Crocheting involves only a limited number of stitches, but by combining them you can create many different patterns. We have devised a system of symbols for the stitches, and these symbols are used in a pictorial diagram of each pattern or motif. From the diagram you can see the degree of difficulty of each project, and you can tell at a glance how far along you are by checking your work against the diagram. While you may be unfamiliar with this approach to crocheting, we feel sure that, with a bit of practice, you will find it much quicker and easier than a row-by-row description method.

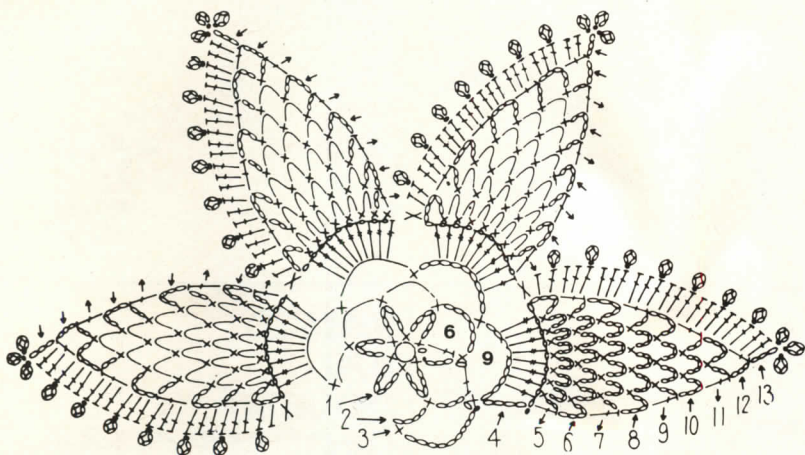
To get your project working smoothly, read the instructions and consult the abbreviations. As you proceed with the aid of the diagram, keep checking back to the CROCHET BASICS section at the end of the magazine for the symbols.

Take, for example, the diagram shown here. Rows or rounds are numbered in lightface; a boldface number inside a loop tells you how many chain stitches to make in that loop. The abbreviation for chain

stitch is ch, or ch st, and the symbol is O. In this sample diagram, you can see that in Round 1 a loop has 6 ch, while a loop in Round 3 has 9 ch. In Round 4, you are working in groups of 9 treble crochets, for which the abbreviation is tr and the symbol is $\overline{\text{T}}$. Only part of Round 3 is given in detail. That is because the same series of stitches is repeated all the way around. Likewise, only one petal is shown in full detail, because the same pattern is repeated each time. Arrows indicate the direction of work. Note that some patterns will require special symbols, and these will appear alongside the diagram with an explanation.

The additional diagrams - completed work, details of edging, etc. - will assist you in making more advanced crochet projects.

You are now ready to try your hand at any of our lovely patterns. A word of advice: Always read the instructions carefully before you begin. They may contain information on a fancy stitch, or on edging or assembling, that is not shown in the diagram.

All about cottons and hooks

There are many types of crochet thread on the market, and several types of hooks. To help you choose the right yarn and the right hook, here is a description of the more common crochet cottons, with their yardage, and a chart of hook size equivalents. Keep in mind that your individual crocheting style may call for a slightly thicker or thinner hook than the one recommended for a specific project.

CLASSICAL THREAD: Six-cord crochet cotton is available in several colors and thicknesses (the higher the number, the finer the thread), and it is tightly twisted. Four-cord, three-cord or uncorded thread is less expensive and easy to obtain.

Each ball weighs 20 grams, or approx. 3/4 of an ounce.

RND 75-115: Complete 20 **diamonds** then 20 **roses** as per Diagram 3. On rnd 97, for **heart of roses** work thus: 2 om, 1 ch, sc over stem of last dc, 3-dc popcorn <pc> (= 2 dc in mesh, dc in dc, remove hook

from lp, insert hook in sc and pull up dropped lp), 2 om; on rnd 98, work 1 om, 1 ch, sc over stem of dc, 3-dc pc (work first 2 dc in next mesh, work 3rd dc in sc on rnd below), 1 ch, dc, 2 ch, dc, 1 ch and dc in same sp as 3rd dc of pc, 1 ch, sc over stem of prev dc, 3-dc pc (2 dc in mesh, 1 dc in dc), 1 om; on rnd 99, work in same way as on rnd 97 but work 2 ch sts after pc. At end of rnd 115, fasten off.

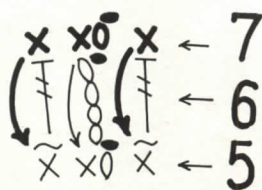
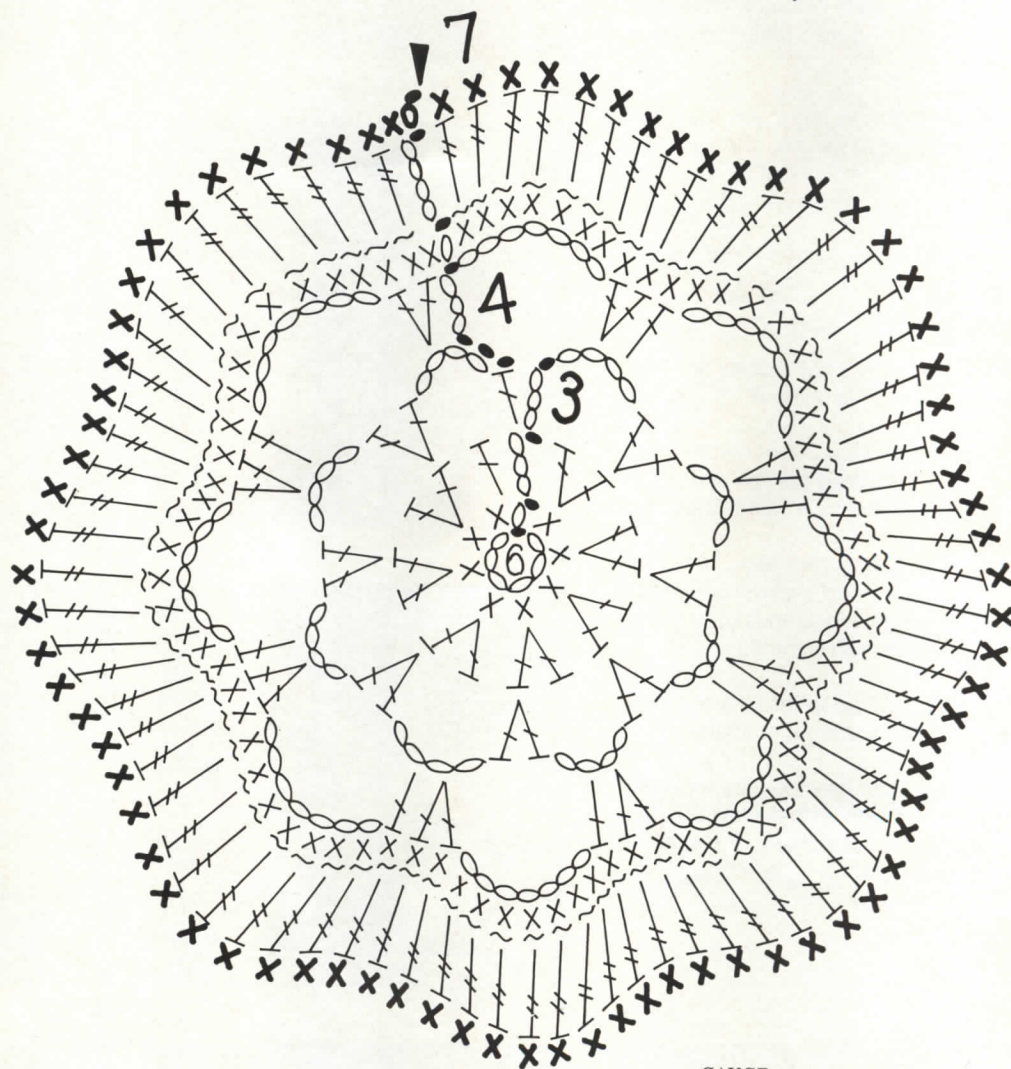


As a crocheter of long standing, you probably have a carry-along project going at all times, and you never leave home without it. Our tubework coaster is one of the simplest and most satisfying projects to take with you wherever you go. No need to concentrate too hard — except maybe to get the tubework right, and there our step-by-step filmstrip will guide you along. The coaster grows very quickly into a most practical item for your own table surfaces or to give away as a gift. Nobody can ever have enough coasters to go around, so feel free to make as many as you like. They will all be put to good use.

SIZE:
4" in diameter.

MATERIALS:
Loosely twisted crochet cotton, 4-ply, white, sufficiently thick to work with steel crochet hook US size 2 or SIZE FOR GAUGE, about 30 yds for each coaster.



rnd 6: insert hook in front strand only of sc below
rnd 7: insert hook under both strands of tr below and back strand of sc on rnd 5 at the same time

GAUGE: rnds 1-3 are 2 ins across

GAUGE:
First 3 rnds are 2" in diameter measured across ch lps.

TO MAKE:
Ch 6 and join with sl st to form ring. RND 1: Ch 1, in ring work 8 sc; close with sl st in first sc. RNDs 2-7: Work following diagram. On rnd 4, work dc in 2 center sts of ch-4 lps. On rnd 5, work sc in dc and in ch sts below. To work tubework on rnds 6 and 7, refer to "Filmstrip of How-tos."

TUBEWORK USING TRIPLE CROCHET

The first two photos show how to work tr on rnd 6. Photos 3 to 5 show how to close on rnd 6 and to begin rnd 7. The tubework shapes up on photos 6 through 9.

1- Yo twice, insert hook in front strand only of next sc on rnd 5.

2- Yo and pull up lp (you now have 4 lps on hook). Yo and work off lps on hook 2 by 2.

3- After completing last tr you have one lp on hook. To close rnd, insert hook in top of ch-4 counting as first tr.

4- Sk 2 sc on rnd 5, then insert hook in back strand only of next sc on rnd 5 and yo once.

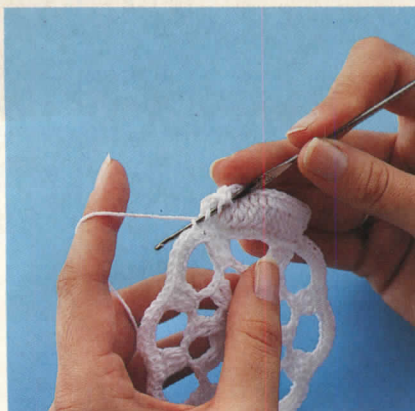
5- Pull up lp thru 2 of the 3 lps on hook; you now have 2 lps on hook.

6- Yo and draw thru 2 lps on hook. You have just completed first sc and at the same time started tube with tr leaning to the left.

7- To work all subsequent sc, insert hook under both top strands of next tr as well as next strand on rnd 5.

8- After yo, pull up lp thru sts of rnds 5 and 6, then complete sc normally.

9- Here you can see the tube emerging as it is closed with sc in back while the tr stitches line up diagonally to create the raised effect in front.

TO MAKE
Motif: Ch 130 for *Motifs A and B*, ch 135 for *Motif C*. **ROW 1:**

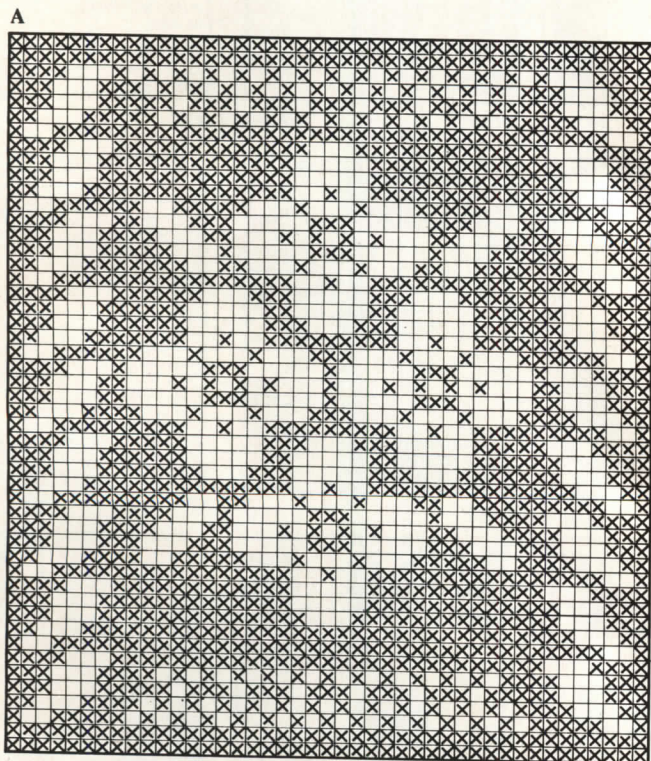
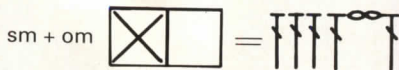
Ch 3 (= first dc throughout), work dc in 5th st from hook and in each st across; ch 3, turn each row. **NEXT ROWS:** Work following respective pat diagram. 1 solid mesh <sm> = dc in each of next 3 sts. 1 open mesh <om> = 1 ch, sk 2 sts, dc in next st. For sm over om, work 2 dc in ch-2 lp below and 1 dc in next dc. At end of last row, fasten off.

Finishing: Complete fabric cover for each album. Sew motif in place on front cover with slip stitches.

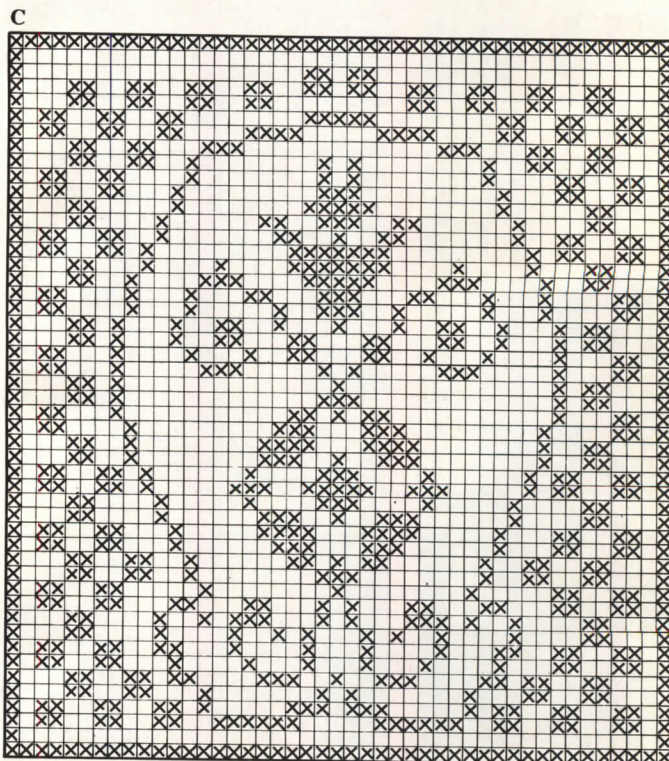

row. NEXT ROWS: Work following pat diagrams. As of row 16, complete each edge motif separately.

Lace C and D: Ch 307 or number of sts desired having multiple of 60 + 7 for lace C or 30 + 7 for lace D. Work following pat diagrams in same way as for lace A and B.

TO MAKE:
Beg at center of tablecloth, ch 193 + 5 to turn (3 ch count as first dc and 2 ch form first open mesh or om). RND 1: Dc in 9th st from hook, then work **2 ch, sk 2 sts, dc in next st** 63 times (= 64 om in all), * 5 ch, dc in same st as last st, rep from * once more, cont on other side of beg ch, work from ** to ** 64 times (= 65 om on each side of beg ch). RND 2: 1 shell <sh> (= 3 dc, 3 ch and 3 dc) over stem of last dc on rnd 1, sh in next om, 64 om, 2 ch, sh in each of 2 om at end, 64 om, 2 ch; up to rnd 52, close each rnd with sl st in top of ch-3 (= first dc throughout) and, up to rnd 20, cont on each with 3 sl sts to beg new rnd in ch lp of first sh. WELL-ORGANIZED CHAIN LOOPS

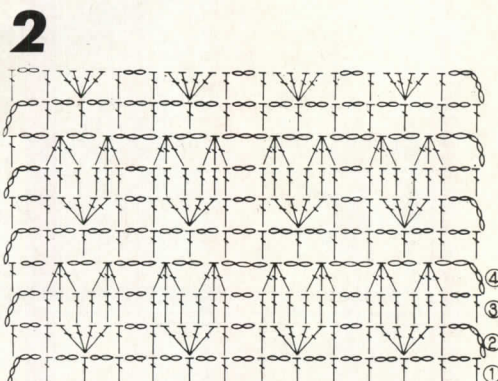
There is one thing every crocheter knows full well. Whatever the project, it will always involve several basic stitches: chain stitches, half double crochets, double crochets, and so on. The chain loop is simply a series of chain stitches.

Depending on its length, the crocheter can create flower or wave effects, firework bursts, sheaves of wheat, or even a rosette window. Chain loops are especially striking when they are used as openwork to alternate with solid areas. Then from your fingers will emerge a magic play of light and shadow.



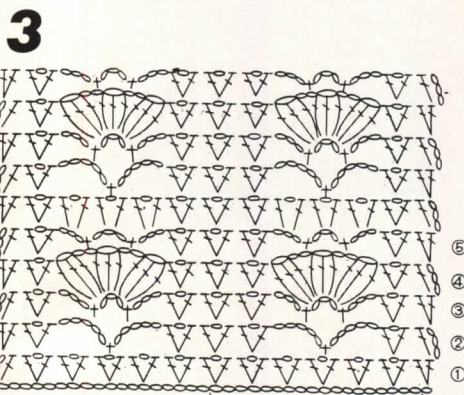

1- Swatch (37 sts and 18 rows) : For this pattern, the number of sts in the foundation ch must be a multiple of 4 plus 1. Motif is repeated every 2 rows.

2- Odd-numbered rows (RS of pat) : Sk 3 sts on row below, work double triple crochet <dtr> in next st. Here is how to work dtr : yo 3 times and pull up lp in dtr below - you now have 4 lps on hook, as shown on photo.

3- After pulling up lp in st on row below, yo and work off lps on hook thus : * yo and draw thru 2 lps on hook, rep from * twice more - 2 lps left on hook.

4- Dtr has just been completed thus : yo and draw thru 2 lps on hook.

5- Yo, with hook back of dtr work dc in first st of 3 sts just skipped.

6- Work dc in each of next 2 sts in same way as on photo 5.

7- Even-numbered rows (WS of pat) : Work dtr in top of dtr below same as on odd-numbered rows.

8- Dtr has just been completed.

9- Beg at first skipped dc and with hook in front of dtr, work dc in each of 3 sts just skipped. The dtr will thus appear as "raised" on RS of work.

On its right side, this swatch looks like a series of very regular zig-zags. But turn it over, and you'll think you are seeing a knitted cable. The texture of this pattern is so solid that whatever the project, it can be relied on to keep its shape, to the sheer amazement of expert crocheters and knitters alike.

However, we all know that knitted or crocheted, the final result will stand or fall on its regularity. This pattern qualifies, despite all that openwork. A classic garment, with



square armholes and a simple neckline, is an assignment it can handle to perfection. The

only finishing you'll need is edging around the neck and loop buttonholes. If you are handy

with neat seams, here is an ideal pattern for a garment that's reversible.

1- Four 2-color motifs joined together. Work first 3 rnds of motif in pink, next 3 rnds in blue and last rnd (that is, rnd 7), alternating the 2 colors: pink in each corner and blue on the sides. Join motifs on rnd 7 at picots in corners and at ch lps across sides by replacing center ch st with sl st worked in corresp picot or ch lp of adjacent motif.

2- Four 3-color motifs joined together. Work first 3 rnds in red, next 3 rnds in brown and rnd 7 in dark green. Join motifs as shown in Diagram A.

3- Two-color motif. Work first 3 rnds in red and next 4 rnds in dark green.

Changing colors

At end of rnd 3: Close rnd 3 with sl st in first sc. Cut thread. RS facing, attach new color with sl st in 2nd st of any shell.

At end of rnd 6: Leave on hook last 2 lps of dc forming 2nd half of last ch lp on rnd 6, drop yarn, pick up color intended for rnd 7 and work off 2 lps on hook with this new color. If rnd 7 is 2-tone, carry dropped color by concealing it inside stitches; for new color change pick up dropped color and work off last lp on hook with new color in same way as before. Work each color change in this way.

End of chain-loop rounds

There are two ways to end this type of round: in center of last ch lp (Diagram A) or in first sc (Diagram B).

Diagram A: Instead of 5 ch sts, ch 2 and replace last 3 ch sts with 1 dc worked in first sc of rnd (Figures 1 and 2). This makes it possible to begin next rnd in center of last ch lp.

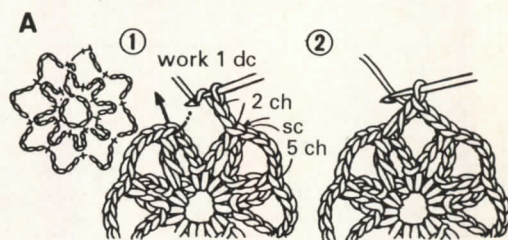
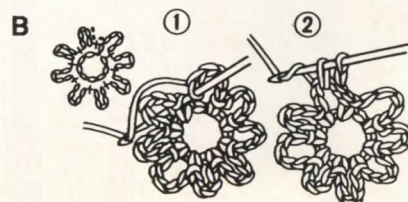
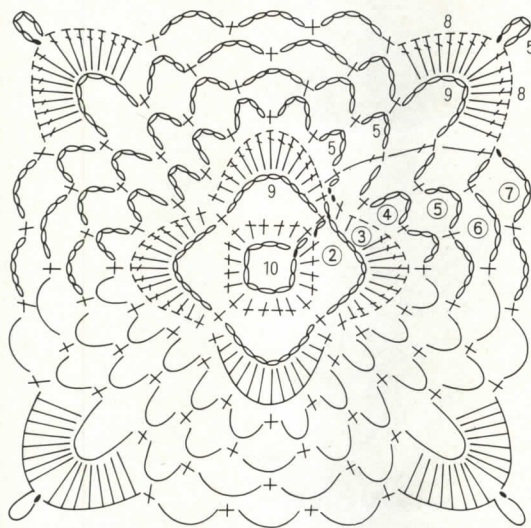
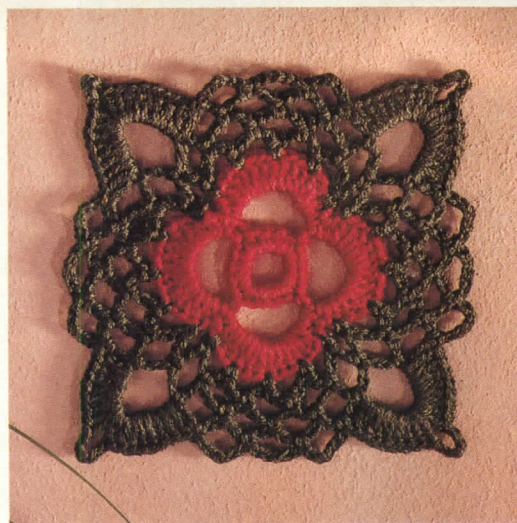

We all know that patchwork is fun. But joining motifs into afghans or garments can also be a truly artistic experience.

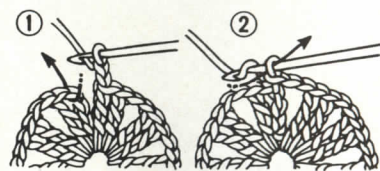
When you add the extra element of color, the final effect will reflect your taste and skill. Change color on part of a round or on a whole round. Do it every two rounds, every three rounds or whatever. Play with hues until you get the right combination. As you become color wise, your yarn palette is sure to produce a magnificent masterpiece.



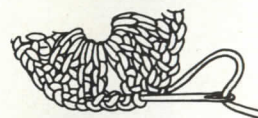
Fastening off

There are two ways to do this.

1- With hook. Join last and first st of rnd with sl st by inserting hook as shown in Fig. 1. Next, work one more sl st thru lp on hook (see Fig. 2) and cut thread, leaving tail about 2 1/2" long. With tapestry needle, conceal tail in sts of motif.

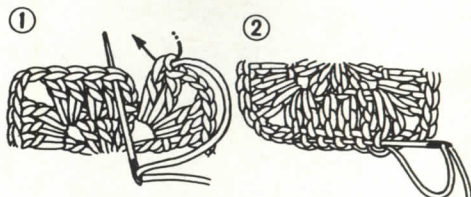

2- With tapestry needle. After completing last st of rnd, cut thread leaving tail about 2 1/2" long. Thread blunt-end needle with tail and pass needle under both top strands of first st of rnd (in Fig. 1, needle is inserted in top of ch-3 counting as first dc of rnd), then pass it thru 2 lps on the right as per arrow in Fig. 1 to complete st. At end of row 27, ch 5 and rep from ** for 2nd loop, and so on, until you have 14 loops in all. At end of 27th row of 14th loop, ch 5 to turn and work 1 row **edging** across **neck edge**: * 10 dc, 2 ch, sc in next ch lp and 2 ch, rep from * across, end with 9 dc, 3 ch and sl st in next st. Fasten off.

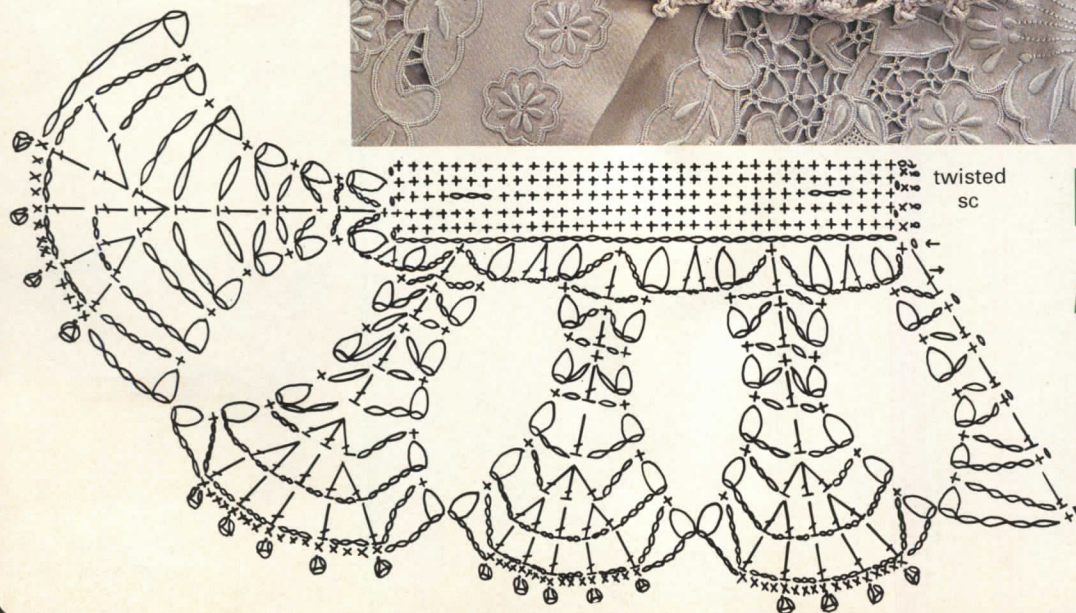

FILMSTRIP OF HOW-TOS

Bring back the days of yore with this updated version of a very feminine jabot, so versatile that it will look as elegant on a solid-color silk blouse as on a classic jacket in black velvet.



PINEAPPLE
MOTIFS

IN PRAISE OF THE PINEAPPLE

There is hardly a crocheter who has not at some point in her career made a project involving pineapples. This all-time favorite is not too hard to create. What you have to do, is organize a few chain stitches, double crochets and popcorns. The motif will then take shape regardless of whether you work back and forth in rows or in the round. For greater beauty, you can outline each pineapple with shells or flowers or whatever. You can even start a garland that way.

A popular motif for decor items such as cushions or mats, the pineapple is also widely used for garments, such as pullovers or cardigans. Here, we introduce it in a very special accessory.

Our jabot – or front frill – is worked back and forth in rows. On this pattern, the motifs are separated by means of chain loops and picots. If you prefer to have the motifs closer together, be your own designer: omit the chain loops between the motifs, thus obtaining a continuous pineapple garland. Remember that 3 chains count as the first double crochet throughout.

BUTTONHOLE BAND FOR JABOT

1 - Buttonholes: To begin jabot, ch 34 + 1 to turn. *Row 1:* Sc in 2nd st from hook and in each st across; ch 1, turn. *Row 2:* 34 sc; ch 1, turn. Photo shows one buttonhole being made while working *Row 3:* Ch 3 (outlined here in yellow) and sk 3 sts on row 2 (also outlined in yellow).

2 - After working 3 ch for buttonhole, complete rest of *row 3* with sc.

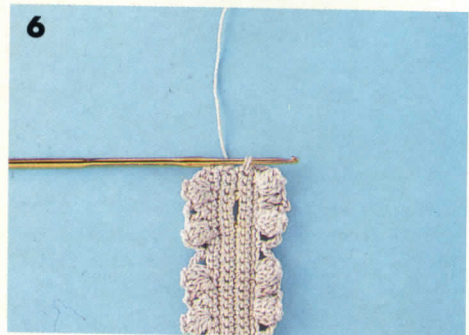
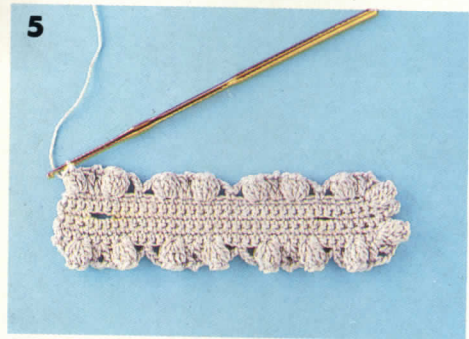
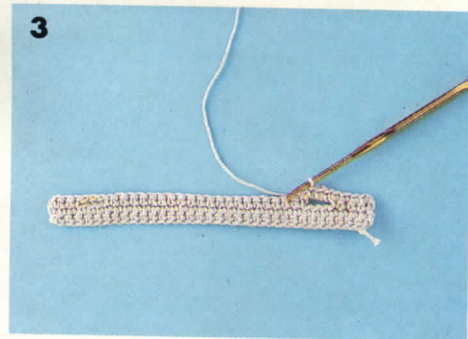
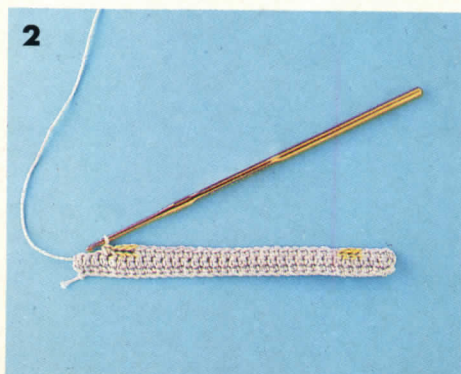
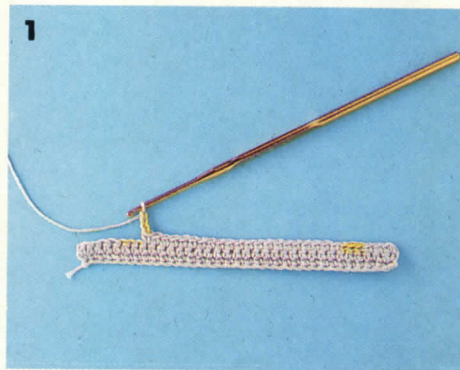
3 - Row 4: Sc in each sc across, 3 sc over ch-3 lp forming buttonhole.

4 - Directions for popcorn st: After working 6 dc in corresp st, remove hook from lp, insert hook under both top strands of first dc of 6-dc grp just made, pick up dropped lp.

5 - Finishing the popcorn st: To shape popcorn, pull picked-up lp of 6th dc thru 2 top strands of first dc.

6 - Twisted sc (step 1): Pull up lp as you would to work a regular sc, then turn hook from left to right so that tip faces you.

7 - Twisted sc (step 2): Turn hook, again moving from left to right, so as to work off 2 lps on hook with one yo. Thus you will have gone a complete circle with the hook before working off the 2 lps of each sc (twisted sc made).





Clearly classical and finely feminine, this cardigan is made in shells, shells, shells all over. The stitch is airy. So we have provided a fairly solid edging to help the garment maintain its shape. Playful picots keep the edging from being too severe.

To remain in the timeless mode, we chose yarn in tender powder green – a rather neutral color. It will bond easily with almost anything you want to wear, but you are free to change the color to suit your complexion and match the rest of your outfit. Of this you may be sure: with its super-classical allure, the cardigan will top any blouse quite elegantly.

SHELL CARDIGAN

MEASUREMENTS: Bust, 40 7/42". Shoulder width, 15 1/2". Length of cardigan, 19 1/2". Sleeve length, 20 3/4".

MATERIALS: Ribbon thread, powder green, or any thread sufficiently thick to work with aluminum crochet hook US size 3/D. Buttons, 1/2" in diameter, 8. Two aluminum crochet hooks, US size 1/B and size 3/D or SIZE FOR GAUGE.

GAUGE: One motif (that is, 6 sts) worked with larger hook is 1 1/8" wide; 10 rows are 4" high.

TO MAKE

Back: With larger hook, ch 109 + 1 to turn and refer to diagram of shell stitch (= pat st). ROW 1:

Inserting hook in lower strand of sts of beg ch, work sc in 2nd st from hook, then * sk 2 sts, 5 dc in next st, sk 2 sts, sc in next st, rep from * 17 times more; ch 1, turn each row. ROWS 2-28: Work even in pat st. Be sure to make your stitches regular and fairly loose so that shells will be airy. At end of row 28, do not fasten off, pass ball thru lp of last dc on row 28 and pull tight. Now carry thread to 2nd dc of next sh and join with sl st. **Shape armholes:** Refer to diagrams 1 (for right-hand armhole) and 2 (for left-hand armhole).

Right half front: With larger hook, ch 55 and work 28 rows in pat st same as for Back. **Shape armhole and neck** following diagram 2.

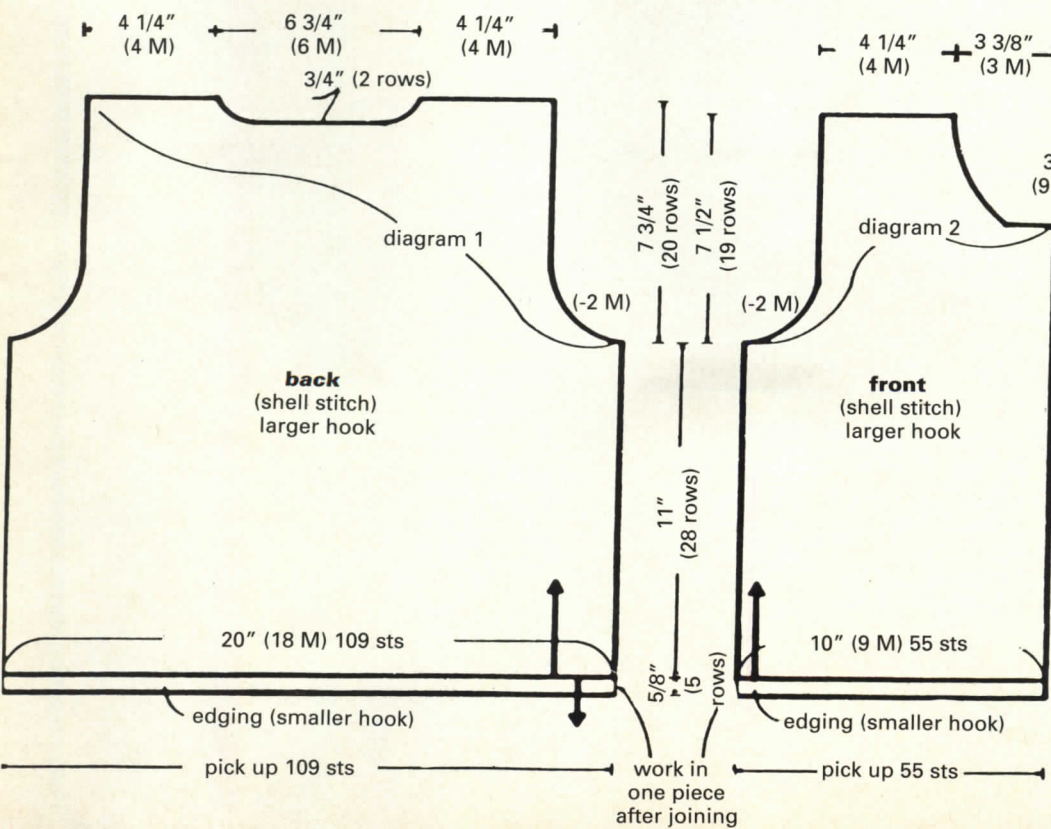
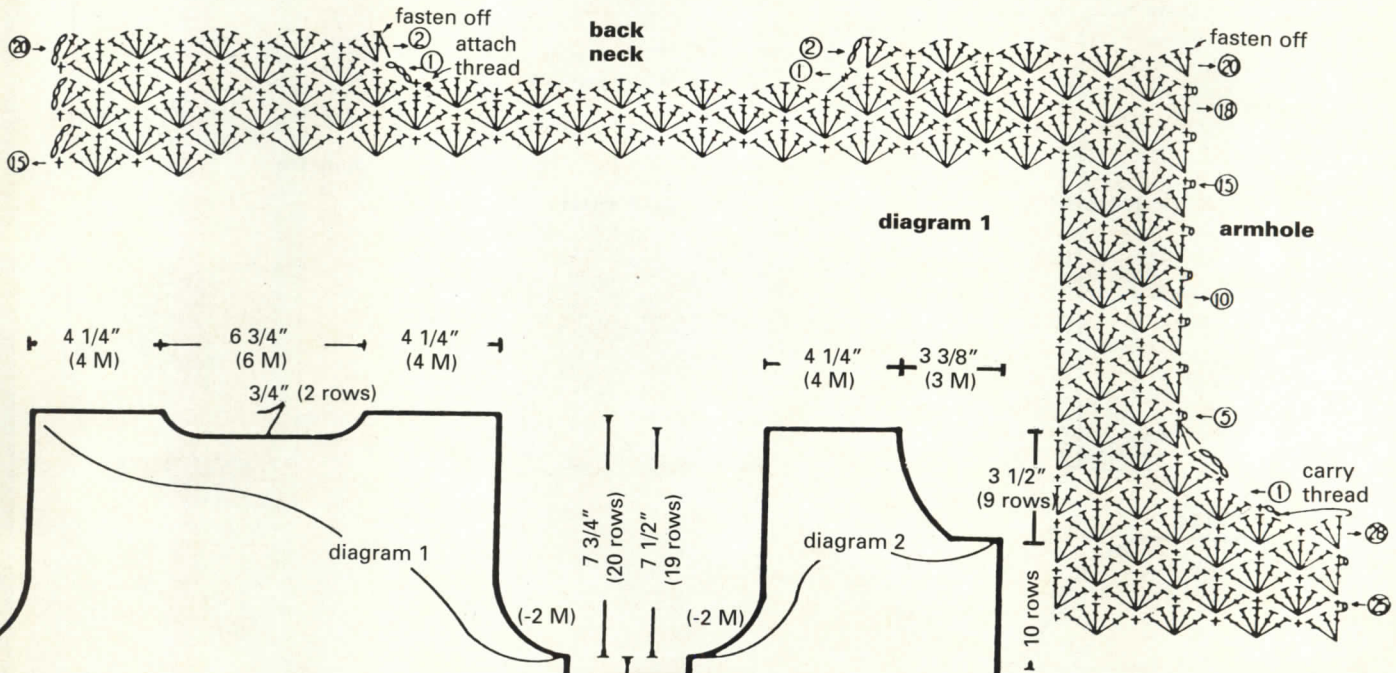
Left half front: Same as Right Half Front, but reverse all shapings.

Sleeves: Work following diagram 3 and overall pattern of sleeve, using larger hook.

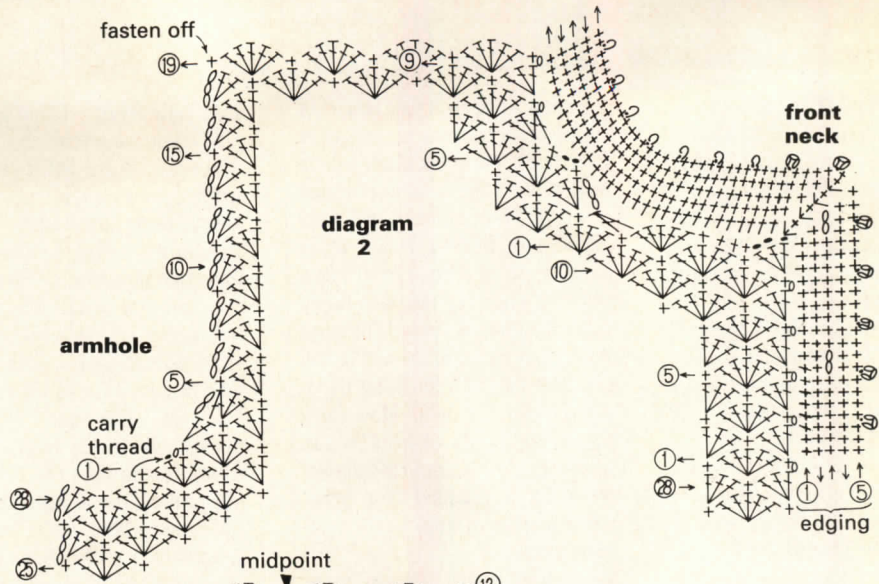
Finishing: Placing pieces RS tog, join *shoulder seams* with sl sts. Join *side seams* thus: * sl st in corresp sts on both edges of seam inserting hook thru both thicknesses, 2 (or 3) ch, rep from * across. **Edgings:** With RS facing and smaller hook, work 5 rows as shown. On first row across each *sleeve edge* and *body edge*, insert hook under both rem strands of beg ch. Across *edges of fronts* and *neck*, insert hook over stem of all edge dc and under both top strands of all edge sc. On row 3 of right-front band,

shape 8 buttonholes, spacing them as shown on overall pattern of "Edgings."

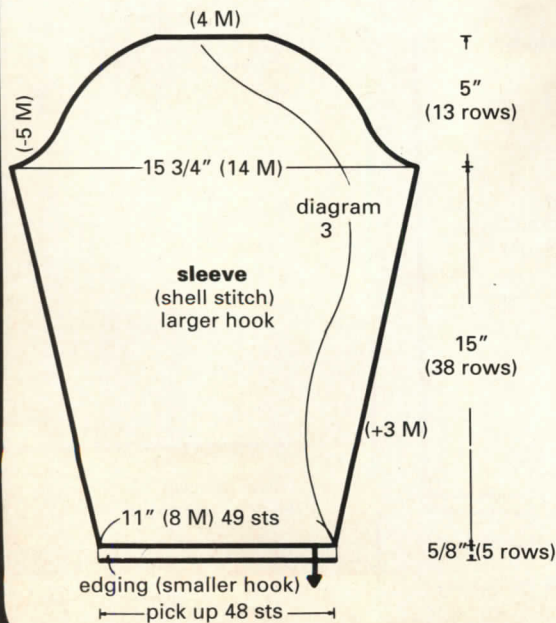
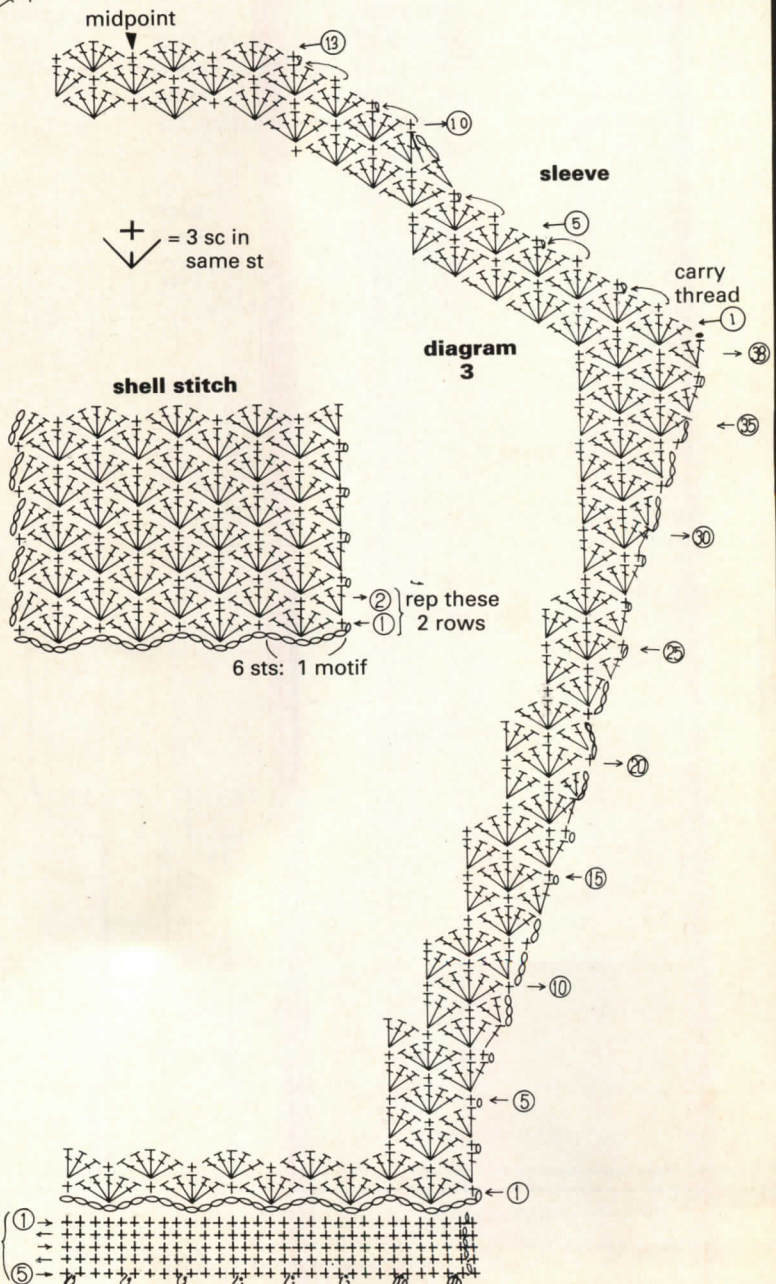
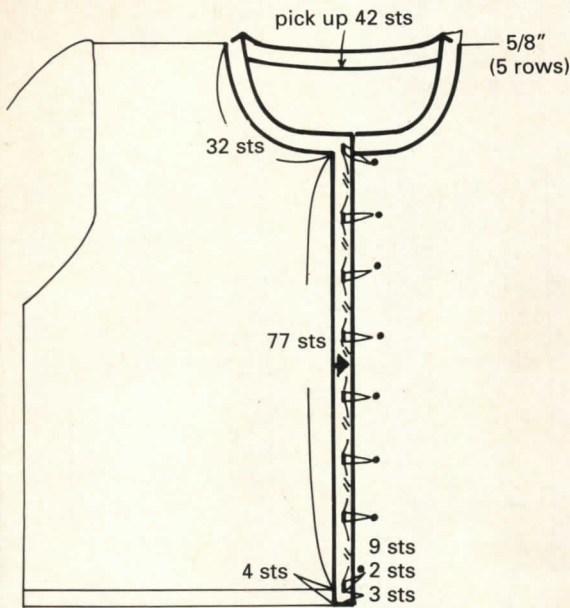
